Then he flies down to the lake water.


He wades into the water.

Female great egret takes the moss and tucks it into the nest.


They put more and more moss on the nest until it is big enough to hold three babies.

The baby chicks grow bigger and bigger but still they cannot fly.


And the lake is not a safe place.

One by one, they snatch the fish from mother and father.


Then One fledgling flaps his wings and flies to a nearby branch.
